

Shizuoka City has a wide variety of sightseeing opportunities.




It is amidst this scenery that the ancestors of Shizuoka City created all sorts of human drama, and shaped the wonderful culture of the city.

Yunoshima Hot Springs Bathhouse (Map P35)

This is a municipal day-trip hot springs public bath located amid the rich greenery of the mountains in the upper reaches of the Warashina River.

Shimizu Nishizato Hot Springs "Yamasemi-no Yu" (Map P55)

This is a public day-trip hot springs facility in Shimizu Forest Park. There is also an outdoor bathing area.

A one-minute walk from the Nishizato Onsen bus stop, taking Hours: Weekdays, 9:30 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. Weekends and the bus from JR Shimizu Station or Okitsu Station headed | National Holidays, 9:30 a.m. to 8:30 p.m. (April through toward Tadanuma Shako (via Ohira); or a five-minute walk | October) or 9:30 a.m. to 7:30 p.m. (November through March) from the Teraojima bus stop, (23 km)

Umegashima Plum Blossom Festival (Enjoy viewing the flowers of about 500 plum trees.) [Umegashima: Umegashima Baien Plum Garden] (mid-March)

April

Shizuoka Festival [Shizuoka City Area] (First Saturday and Sunday in April) Enjoy watching a recreation of how Tokugawa levasu enjoyed flower-viewing under the full bloom of the cherry blossoms. Watch a "royal" flower-viewing procession, a procession entering the castle, the exciting nighttime cherry blossom dance and costumed merchants selling food to visitors with a total of 400 per-

Shizuoka Hobby Show (A trade fair that presents the latest products of the best manufacturers of minature models in the world) [Magarikane: Twin Messe] (Mid-May)

Abe River Fireworks (The largest fireworks display in Shizuoka City) [Upstream from the Abekawa Bridge] (Last Saturday of July)



Shimizu Tanabata Festival (About 130 bamboo decorations are displayed in the shopping area) [In front of Shimizu Station ~ Ginza] (Early July)

Tomoe River Lantern-Floating (Events include the floating of lanterns down the river and waterside stage performances) [Tomoe River] (July 16)

Start of The Beach Season (Enjoy the gentle waves of Uchihama and the beaches of Masaki, where you can swim in the warm Pacific. Shizuoka City has numerous beaches where you can go swimming.) [Mochimune, Miho]

Start of The Southern Alps Mountain-climbing Season (A Shinto ceremony is conducted to pray for the safety of summer mountain climbers.) [Tashiro] (July 16)

Nihondaira Festival (Rocket and static fireworks illuminate the night.) [Nihondaira] (Late July)

August

Port of Shimizu Festival [Shimizu: Hinode Pier and other locations] (The weekend - Friday, Saturday and Sunday - of the first Sunday in August every year)

This festival is held on the anniversary of the official opening of the Port of Shimizu. The highlight is the grand dance "Minato Kappore" in which local residents participate.

Bon-odori Dance of Utogi (The folk dancing, which continues from early evening to late at night, is a nationally designated significant intangible folk cultural asset.) [Utogi: Toun Temple] (August 14 and





Shizuoka Summer Festival Night Market (This festival includes stalls, open cafes and all sorts of street events.) [Shizuoka City Area] (Mid-August)



September

Shizuoka Odakkui Festival (A festival in which various regional dance groups compete.) [Shizuoka City Area] (Mid-September)

Togeppo-Saioku Temple "Moon-Viewing Gathering" (A tea ceremony is held in a traditional Kyoto-style garden while viewing the moon.) [Mariko: Togeppo-Saioku Temple] (Mid-September)

Kusanagi Shrine "Ryusei Noroshi" (A cylinder filled with gun powder is attached to a long piece of bamboo and ignited.) [Kusanagi] (A Sunday or national holiday near September 20)

October

"Mikan" Tangerine-Picking (Enjoy juicy "mikan" tangerines) [Kusagaya] (October 1 ~ December)

Toro Festival (A field event rich in historical color.) [Toro: Toro Ruins] (Early October)

Hagoromo Festival [Miho: Hagoromo-no Matsu] (Second Saturday and Sunday of October)
In honor of the French dancer Elene Giuglaris, events include creative dance, Miho Takigi-Noh and haiku poetry competitions. The Noh play "Hagoromo" is performed here, and is a top Takigi Noh (outdoor Noh play performed by firelight) in Japan, held at the spiritual home of the legend of Hagoromo.

Shizuoka Mikoshi Festival (A festival honoring the "mikoshi" portable shrine of the local traditional culture and industry; a total of 500 people shoulder the portable shrine in a procession.) [Shizuoka City Area] (Late October)

Thailand-Japan Friendly Ties – Nagamasa Festival (Thai products and cuisine will be presented at Sengen-dori, which is said to be the birthplace of Nagamasa Yamada) [Baban-cho ~ Miyagasaki-cho: Sengen-dori] (Mid-October)

Sumpu Honyama Tea Festival (Tea tasting and sale of various teas) [Outer Sumpu Park] (Late October-Early November)

November

Daidogei World Cup in Shizuoka (Street Performance) [Shizuoka City Area] (The weekend closest to November 3) The Daidogei World Championships have been held since 1992. Performers from around the world gather to compete in such arts as juggling, pantomime and magic, using the streets of Shizuoka City as their stage.

Akihasan Akiha Temple Grand Festival (The fire-walking held at night on the 16th is a famous event, with numerous pilgrims walking over smoldering flames.) [Nishi-Kubo: Akiha Temple] (December 15 and 16)

Opening of Riverwell Ikawa Ski Area [lkawa] (End of December ~ Early March)



"Joya-no Kane" New Year's Eve Temple Bells (The temples listed below sound the temple bell.) (December 31)



There will be Oden stands not only from Shizuoka City but from all across Japan.) [Aoba Symbol Road]



Seafood and Mountain Food – You Can Experience All Sorts of Japanese Food in Shizuoka

Because of the warm climate and the vast coastline that continues along the Pacific Ocean, Shizuoka is blessed with all sorts of natural foods. This natural bounty, together with the wisdom and skills of our predecessors, has borne fruit in the form of special local products. When you come to Shizuoka, don't miss the opportunity to experience the local flavors and skills to the fullest.

Tea < Year-round > When people talk about green tea, they think of Shizuoka.

or you can enjoy relaxing over a cup of Japanese tea.

You can enjoy the tea fields, which look like a green carpet,

"Tororo-jiru" Yam Soup "Yama-imo" Japanese yam, which is packed with nutrition, is grated and poured over "mugi-gohan" (cooked rice with barley). Perfect in terms of taste and healthfulness.

Local "Sake" Rice Wine

It is said that the best-tasting sake can be made where the water is pure. Enjoy the aroma and fresh smoothness of the local brew.

Abe River "Mochi" Rice Cakes

This is a well-known Shizuoka confection that is eaten with soybean flour and sugar sprinkled on top. It is said that Tokugawa levasu gave this sweet its name. It has been sold at Abekawa-Aze (Abe River Ridge) since the Edo Period.

"Shirasu" Baby Sardines

< Late March through December > Fresh "shirasu" with beautiful transparent meat is a famous product of Suruga Bay that can only be enjoyed from late March through January.



"Wasabi" Horseradish

< Year-round > Utogi, located upstream on the Abe River, which flows through Shizuoka City, is the birthplace of wasabi cultivation.



Suruga "Maki-e" **Ornamental Lacquerware**

Varnished containers, such as inkstone boxes, trays and vases.

Suruga Kites

It is said that 400 years ago, kites were flown in celebration of victory in battle. Apparently, kites are not only used for flying nowadays; there are also many people who like to use them as a form of interior decoration.



Suruga "Takesensuji-Zaiku" Bamboo Latticeware

This delicate bamboo craft is a nationally designated traditional handicraft.

"Mikan" Tangerines < Year-round >

< October through March > Many varieties of mikan originated in Shizuoka, such as the Aoshima Unshu, which developed thanks to the warm climate. Taste the juicy sweetness of Shizuoka, a mikanproducing area with a long history.

< December through early May > The street along Kuno Beach on Suruga Bay is also called Ichigo Kaigan-dori (Strawberry Beach Road). You can enjoy picking strawberries from January through early May.





Late 2nd Century

The Toro Ruins are representative across Japan as a remnant of the Yayoi Period. People began farming the land and started to live in communities.

Around 1300 Lord Imagawa, the regional feudal lord, established his headquarters and controlled the two areas of Suruga and Totoumi.

Around 1550 When Tokugawa Ieyasu was a child, he lived in Sumpu as a hostage of Imagawa Yoshimoto.

Tokugawa leyasu (1542-1616)

Carrying on the quest of Oda Nobunaga and Toyotomi Hideyoshi to unite the nation, Ieyasu established the Edo Bakufu feudal government, of which he was the first shogun. Despite having transferred the title of shogun to his son Hidetada after only two years and retiring to Sumpu (current-day Shizuoka), Ieyasu continued to wield political power as a de facto shadow

shogun from this base.

1603

Tokugawa Ieyasu became the first Shogun of the Edo Shogunate.

1605


Tokugawa Ieyasu withdrew as Shogun to live in Sumpu, and expanded both the Edo and Sumpu local governments.

Yui Shosetsu (1605~1651)

A military strategy scholar of the Edo Period who opened a military academy called "Chokodo."

"Shimizu Jirocho" – the main name of Yamamoto Chogoro (Crusader for the underdog/Entrepreneur) (1820 \sim 1893)

Although he used to fight and gamble, he later repented and lived for others during the latter part of his life. It is said that he successfully coordinated the construction of the Port of Shimizu and the development of the foot of Mt. Fuji, and that he started an English language academy using a room of a boaters' lodge called "Suehiro," which he opened in his later years.



Why Not Walk in the Footsteps of Our Predecessors?

Shizuoka City is a town rich in history. If you trace the footsteps of the people of long ago, you are sure to discover the great depth of Shizuoka City.

Master Shoichi 1202 ~ 1280

When he returned to Japan on official duty from Sung (China), Master Shoichi brought back tea seeds and thousands of Buddhist scrolls. It is said that the tea nuts were planted in Suruga-Ashikubo (Ashikubo of Shizuoka City today), near his hometown. He is considered to be the Father of Shizuoka Tea.



Yamada Nagamasa (High Official of Trade and Commerce in Thailand (Ayuthaya Dynasty))(? ~ 1630)

Yamada Nagamasa went to Siam in the early 17th century, and became the leader of the Japanese community in the capital of Ayuthaya. He helped to avert a civil war, gained the trust of the King of Thailand and became a chief retainer.

Jippensha Ikku (Artist and author. Author of "Tokaido-chu Hiza-kuri-ge (Travels on Foot on the Tokaido)") (1765 ~ 1831)

This author created many works in Edo. His masterpiece, "Tokaido-chu Hiza-kuri-ge (Travels on Foot on the Tokaido)," which depicts the humorous travels of Yajirobei and Kitahachi, was a smash hit.



1869 The Sumpu area was renamed "Shizuoka."

Saionji Kimmochi (1849 ~ 1940)



Former Prime Minister. Head Plenipotentiary of the 1919 Paris Peace Conference. Built a villa (Zagyo-so Villa) in Shimizu-Okitsu-Seikenji-cho of Shizuoka City and lived there. Eminent people from various fields visited the villa. The Okitsu Zagyo-so Villa was reconstructed in 2004 by Shizuoka City. The actual building was transferred to Meiji Village.

Keisuke Serizawa (1895 ~ 1984)

(Color dye craftsman; Living National Treasure)

Color dye craftsman and Living National Treasure of "Katae-zome" stencil dyeing (Designated an important intangible cultural asset). Famous in Japan and around the world as a 20th century craftsman of Japan.

2003

Shizuoka City merged with Shimizu City to form the Shizuoka City of today.

2005

Shizuoka City became a government-designated city.

Shizuoka Gity: the city Ieyasu loved

Shizuoka is the historic home of Tokugawa Ieyasu (1542-1616), the renowned Shogun (generalissimo) who established the Edo Bakufu feudal government. The former site of Sumpu Castle, erected by Ieyasu in 1585 before establishing his regime, is located on the north side of Shizuoka Station, retaining the flavor of the Edo period (1603-1867). Shizuoka City developed as a castle town centered on this citadel, and flourished along with Edo (current-day Tokyo), the capital of Japan at that time, as a thriving hub of political, economic and cultural activity.



Sumpu Park

Sumpu Park Map

A lush green park spreads out on the remains of Sumpu Castle built by Tokugawa Ieyasu in 1585. Ieyasu dwelled in this castle for four years prior to moving to Edo Castle, and then again for another 10 years after transferring the official powers of the office of Shogun to his son Hidetada. Today, a bronze statue of Ieyasu, with a falcon perched on his arm, stands at the remains of the castle keep. In Momijiyama Garden, enjoy wonderful tea time, and the seasonal scenery of Suruga.

Information on Sumpu

The old name for Shizuoka City. The provincial capital of Suruga-no-kuni (present-day Shizuoka Prefecture) was established here, with the area known as a post station on the Tokaido Highway from the Kamakura period (1192-1333). Tokugawa leyasu, the founder of the Edo Bakufu feudal government, built a castle here in 1585. The name Sumpu was changed to Shizuoka in 1869.





Higashi-gomon Gate(East Gate)/ Tatsumi Yagura (Turret)

These structures, built on the grounds of Sumpu Castle constructed by Ieyasu in 1585, were intended to blunt attacks by invading forces during wartime. The gate and turret have been restored as extremely sturdy structures reminiscent of centuries past. Inside the turret, there is a reference library.

A Shizuoka Sengen Jinja 静岡浅間神社

Shizuoka Sengen Shrine

This shrine contains an extensive collection of items associated with the Tokugawa Shogunate, the powerful feudal family that ruled Japan for nearly 300 years during the Edo period. Included in the collection is the suit of armor worn by Tokugawa Ieyasu, the first in the line of Tokugawa shoguns, at his coming-of-age ceremony. The existing structure was rebuilt over a 60-year period starting in 1804. Reservations are required to tour the inner shrine, which is famed for its exquisite sculptures. The entrance fee is ¥500 for junior high school students and older, and ¥300 for elementary school students. Tel: 054-245-1820

Rinzai Temple

Ieyasu lived here when he was a child. The main structure of this complex is designated as an important cultural treasure. It is normally not possible to view the main temple except during special admission periods in the spring and fall. It cannot be seen as it is under costruction.

Sumpu Museum

This museum has 180 works of Japanese-style painting and 370 pieces of brush writing by leyasu and Katsu Kaishu in storage and on exhibit.

This is an area with spectacular views of Mt. Fuji looking over vast tea fields. Here you can see and touch Japanese culture and history, play, eat, learn, and enjoy soccermania and all kinds of other fun things.



Nihondaira

One of Japan's most scenic spots. It has been selected as one of the top 100 sightseeing spots in the country. At a height of 307

meters, this hilly area is designated as a National Nature Park, where you can enjoy a rich variety of natural products such as plums, cherry blossoms, tea gardens and "mikan" tangerine fields. From the aerial cableway to Kunozan Toshogu Shrine, you can enjoy a spectacular view of the Byobudani cliff in the direction of the Pacific Ocean with each season.


Mariko/Utsunoya: Basking in the Atmo

Immediately after Tokugawa Ieyasu founded the Edo Shogunate, he ordered the construction of the Tokaido Road to connect the central government of Edo (Tokyo) with Kyoto where the Emperor lived, and "Shuku-Eki" lodging stations were established along the road, "Shuku-Eki" lodging stations were villages along the road where travelers could lodge and where messengers and horses who transported goods rested. There were 53 lodging stations along the Tokaido Road called "Tokaido Road Gojusan-tsugi (the 53 stations of Tokaido Road)," In the vicinity of the current Shizuoka City, there were six lodging areas - Kambara, Yui, Okitsu, Ejiri, Fuchu and Mariko. The Mariko area prospered as the 20th iodging spot from Edo. The town has traces of that era even today.






Warashina: Home of Clear Streams and Hot Springs

Both rivers are known for their pure water and are ranked among the clearest rivers in Japan every year. The first cherry blossom trees that Japan sent had to be destroyed because they had harmful insects. For this reason, the Okitsu Branch of the agricultural testing center which had the latest technology in Japan at the time (currently the fruit tree testing center of the Ministry of Agriculture, Forestry and Fisheries), developed an exclusive variety of cherry blossom trees, and these were sent to the United States.







The area is so scenic that it was selected as one of the Three Places of Scenic Beauty in Japan in 1916.



Hagoromo-no Matsu

Beyond the pilgrimage path that leads south from Miho Shrine, nicknamed "Kami-no Michi (God's Road)," is the site of the legend of the celestial dancer called "Hagoromo-no



Matsu (Pine of Hagoromo)." Crowds gather in the morning on New Year's Day to see the sun rise over the mountains of the Izu Peninsula.




Legend of the Dancer: Hagoromo

The legend of Hagoromo which has spread across Japan and part of Asia, has a similar story in Europe as well. The legend of Hagoromo of Miho is as follows. "Long, long ago, in the village of Miho lived a fisherman named Hakuryo. One day, Hakuryo found a beautiful robe hanging in the branches of a pine tree and decided to take it home. At that moment, a celestial woman appeared and said, 'That is the robe of a celestial being. Please give it back.' However, Hakuryo was so happy that he showed no sign of

wanting to return the robe. Then the woman started to cry saying, 'I cannot return to Heaven unless you return the robe!' Hakuryo said he would give it back on the condition that she danced in the sky for him. The woman gladly obliged, dancing in the spring sky of Miho as her backdrop. Finally, she was able to ascend to Heaven. It is said that she danced in the beautiful early evening moonlight on the night of a full moon."





The 17th lodging area along the Tokaido Road was Okitsu. The area has an atmosphere that moves visitors' hearts.

The Okitsu Inn and the adjacent Yui lodging to the east stand about 8 kilometers apart. There is also the dangerous Satta-Toge Pass. Okitsu Inn is where travelers heading west rest with a sigh of relief after traveling through the pass. Travelers heading east stop at the Okitsu lodging area to prepare for the trip ahead, and then stop at Yui after traveling through the dangerous mountain pass.



Satta-Toge Pass

Satta-Toge Pass is the 3-kilometer pass that is located on the Tokaido Road between the Okitsu and Yui inns. The view of Mt. Fuji from this area is truly breathtaking. Even today, Mt. Fuji is exactly like the "ukiyo-e" painting of Utagawa Hiroshige.

Kudarigegyo is a plate in the shape of clouds engraved with images such as young leaves, flowers and birds, preventing the edge of the beams from rotting in the rain.

Toyozumi Shrine was built in Nagarezukuri style, the way Shinto shrines have been built and structured by keyaki wood and roofed

with sheet copper. It was built in 1825, and have kept several munefudas (wooden plates, which contain all the construction and ownership details about the buildings) of those days when Honden (the sanctuary of the shrine) was first built in 1600. In Otaiko festival, the local young men carry a thick pole on their shoulder, from which hangs a big drum. In turn they go round singing in the neighborhood from New Year's Day to January 3rd every year.



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Sakura shrimp has been well-known from the Edo period but the fishing season and place have not. On the night of December, Meiji 27, a local fisherman went fishing for horse mackerel. He had a floating barrel for a net gathering fish off the fishing boat, when the net was pulled up there were more than 180 liters of sakura shrimps caught instead of horse mackerel. It soon became widely known among fishermen. People can enjoy sakura shrimp as one of the specialties in Yui throughout the year, though the fishing season for sakura shrimp is limited to only spring and autumn.







Ippon-matsu Park (O-uchi)

This park is 304 meters above sea level and you can enjoy a 360 degree panoramic view that includes Mt. Fuji and the Izu Peninsula.

Access

A two-hour walk from the Ouchi Kannon Iriguchi bus stop, taking the Kitakaido-sen bus from JR Shimizu Station.

Reizan Temple (O-uchi)

It is said that this temple was established by the monk

Gyoki of the Nara Period. The main building includes a statue of a thousandhanded "Kannon" goddess, which is a prefecturally-designated cultural asset. The Nio-Mon Gate, which was built during the Muromachi Period, is the second oldest in the prefecture and is a nationally designated important cultural asset.

Access

A 45-minute walk from the Ouchi Kannon Iriguchi bus stop, taking the Kitakaido-sen bus from JR Shimizu Station. (5 km)



Hirono Beach Park (Hirono Kaigan-dori)

The park includes a variety of playground equipment in a 33-meter long, 6.6-meter wide and 18-meter high gigantic wooden pirates' ship and a path

that stretches to Mochimune Fishing Port to a fishing-bank, wading pond and lookout mountain.

Access

A 20-minute walk from the Hirono bus stop, taking the Mochimune-sen bus from JR Shizuoka station and riding for 25 minutes. (9 km) Tel. 054-354-2138 (Fisheries and Fishing Ports Division)

Yuyama Onsen 油山温泉


Yuyama Hot Springs (Yuyama)

This hot springs is known as the place where the soldiers of Lord Imagawa rested from their wounds after battle. You can enjoy many aspects of nature year-round, such as fireflies dancing in the summer.



Access

A 30-minute walk from the Yuyama bus stop taking the Abe-sen bus from JR Shizuoka Station and riding for 40 minutes. (17 km)



Shimizu National Training Center (J-Step) (Yamakiri)

One of only two official Japan Football Association training facilities in Japan, it is used as a training camp for the Japan team, Japan women's team and was also used by the Russian team at the 2002 World Cup.



Access

An eight-minute walk from the Training Center bus stop, taking the Ihara-sen bus from JR Shimizu Station. (7 km)

Map of JR Shizuoka Station-front area and the boarding areas for the "Roman" bus, regular sightseeing bus and taxis





Call the Police Department. Dial 110 (no area code necessary). All calls anywhere in Japan are handled on a 24-hour basis.

How to Call the Police Department

- (1) Pick up the receiver, and if there is an emergency button on the telephone, press it before dialing 110. If there no emergency button, simply dial 110.
- (2) Explain why you are calling; state whether you are calling because of a traffic accident or a crime such as a robbery, etc.
- (3) Give your name and the location of the incident, or the address and landmarks near by.

For Sudden Illnesses or Injuries

Call the Fire Department. Dial 119 (no area code necessary). All calls anywhere in Japan are handled on a 24-hour basis.

How to Call the Fire Department

- (1) Similar to calling the police, press the emergency button before dialing 119, or simply dial 119.
- (2) Since the Fire Department dispatches both the fire brigade and ambulances, explain whether you need the fire brigade or ambulance.
- (3) Give your name and the location or address and landmarks near by.
